#### The Strategy and Tactics Analysis Group

- A staff support agency of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Military Operations
- Activated in August 1960
   Mission: To support Department of the Army operation planning and evaluation activities by war gaming and allied techniques (Army Regulation 15-14, BOARDS, COMMISSIONS, AND COMMITTEES—United States Army Strategy and Tactics Analysis Group)
- Focus on tactical nuclear warfare by ground forces
- Strength grew from 74 (in 1961) to 155 in (January 1973)
- Located in the Rugby Building in Bethesda, Maryland



- Early Operational Practice
  - o 25 Studies completed per year
  - o Large study teams of 10 or more analysts for each study
  - o Formal study advisory groups, met in the Pentagon
  - o Study results briefed up the chain of command
  - o Studies completely documented
  - o Completed study reports formally staffed for approval

• In 1979, the review of Army Analysis Special Study led to CAA's reassignment to the Director of the Army Staff, in support of all the HQDA

## THE COLD WAR CLIMAX 1982 – 1989

- CAA Civilian Director replaces Commanding General (1982)
- The Director is member of the Senior Executive Service, the first is Mr. David Hardison
- The Deputy Director is a Brigadier General, the first is BG Hugh J. Quinn
- Number of completed studies increased, study processes simplified, new methodologies developed
- Focus on future war between North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) and the Warsaw Pact

- Major studies developed the required Army Combat and Support Forces; calculated War Reserve requirements for munitions and equipment; and established the capabilities of the Budgeted Force
- Following Mr. Hardison's retirement in September 1984, Mr. E.B. Vandiver III, Technical Advisor to the DCSOPS became the next Director. His first Deputy was BG Joseph L. Ecoppi
- Review of Army Analysis Extended Special Study began expanded analysis support to the Army in the Field, 1985
- November 1989 the Cold War abruptly ended






# WAR IN THE PERSIAN GULF 1990 – 1991


- In the spring of 1990, CAA conducted wargames of an Iraqi invasion of Kuwait for the Third U.S. Army via man-in-the-loop wargaming
- Iraq invaded Kuwait, 2 August 1990...CAA began wargaming the defense of Saudi Arabia the next day
- CAA provided analysis support to special HQDA Planning Group

#### **Changing Situation**

#### **Changing Analysis Scope**



22 February 1991

- Man-in-the-loop, two-sided, open wargames, conducted for 3 weeks
- Concepts Evaluation Model (CEM) brought up on the defense of Saudi Arabia scenario...man-in-the-loop wargaming ended
- New cases run weekly for the DCSOPS who sent them to the Third Army Commander, LTG Yeosock, who then requested new cases
- Arranged to run CEM cases on the Cray Supercomputer at the Ballistics Research Laboratory, Aberdeen Proving Grounds, Maryland ... many more cases examined
- Final estimates were remarkably accurate: 4-6 days to free Kuwait with fewer than 1,500 U.S. casualties

## THE PEACE DIVIDEND 1991 – 2001

- Army Drawdown
  - o Army reduced in size: 785K military end strength down to 485K
  - o CAA reduced in size by approximately 25%
- 1991: The Soviet Union dissolved
- Korean Scenario gained in importance
  - o CAA provided analysis underpinnings for a new operations plan
  - o Expanded Biannual U.S. Korea Defense Analysis seminars
  - o CAA analysts assigned to HQ U.S. Forces, Korea on a rotational basis

- Growing emphasis on military operations other than war and small conflicts
  - Extensive scenario development with force requirements
  - o Mission Task Organized Forces developed
  - o Numerous political military games
- CAA renamed Center for Army Analysis (1998) ... directed to perform more quick reaction analyses
- CAA analysts deployed to Overseas Operational Commands
  - o Operations Research and Systems Analysis (ORSA) Cells in Federal Republic of Germany
  - o HO U.S. Forces Korea
  - o U.S. Command in Bosnia
  - o Deployable Analytical Support Team created ... participated in major overseas exercises especially Bright Star Exercises in Egypt
- Ouadrennial Defense Review
  - o 1996 and 2000
  - o CAA analysis underpinned Army requirements
- CAA moves to Fort Belvoir, Virginia
  - o New construction from Base Realignment and Closure, 1995
  - o Moved on 22 March 1999
  - o Payne Hall dedication ceremony 25 May 1999
- A Forewarning
  - o Caucasian Wars, Russia vs. Chechnya mid and late 1990s




- o One CAA analyst (Mr. Bill Wright) seriously injured in Pentagon
- o Quadrennial Defense Review abruptly completed
- o CAA analysis program disrupted until HQDA normal functioning restored
- The U.S. Strikes back in Afghanistan
  - o Lessons learned conducted by the RAND Corporation
  - o CAA participated in Lessons Learned Review Board

- HQDA Reorganization 2002
  - o Deputy Chief of Staff (DCS), G-3 became DCS, G-3/5/7 Operations/Plans/Training

  - o CAA Assigned to DCS, G-8



# THE WAR IN IRAQ 2003 – 2011

- CAA supported Third Army Planning Wargames
  - o Two CAA analysts deployed to Army headquarters HQ in Kuwait
  - o Extensive reach-back analysis support
  - o CAA wargame operations, risks, and force requirements





- CAA Analyst deployed to Army HQ in Baghdad
  - o First analyst deployed in September 2003
  - o Developed Incident Reporting System
  - o Deployed analysts increased in number
  - o Supported organizations increased in number
  - o Many analysts deployed on 6-month tours...others as needed
  - o Final deployed analyst returned to CAA in December 2011



- CAA developed Doctrine and Training for deployed analysts
  - o Developed 2-week Deployed Analyst Training Course
  - o Published Handbook for Deployed Analysts
  - o Published Commander's Handbook on Analysis Support
  - o Documented analysis support in classified and unclassified versions



# THE WAR IN AFGHANISTAN 2003 – 2022

- U.S. Commander Afghanistan requested analysis support in 2003
  - Established Incident Reporting System (Major Allison Stewart)
- Launched a series of deployed analysts on 6-month tours to:
  - o Afghanistan 75 (CY 2004-2021)
  - o Iraq 41 (CY 2002-2011)
  - o Horn of Africa 11 (CY 2011-2016)
  - o Philippines 5 (CY 2011-2014)
  - o Middle East 17 (CY 2014-2022)

- Extensive reach-back support provided by CAA from Fort Belvoir, Virginia
- Major analyses addressed Afghan Force requirements, logistics support, medical evacuation requirements, and other operational and logistical issues

- Office of Deputy Undersecretary of the Army for Operations Research (ODUSA (OR)) terminated
- Mr. Walter Hollis retired
- CAA assigned selected ODUSA (OR) functions
  - o Bilateral Analysis Exchanges with Allied Armies (Korea, Canada, Australia, United Kingdom, France, and Germany)
  - o Quality assurance reviews of Army Analysis Activities
- Director of CAA designated Senior Analyst of the Army with elevated Senior Executive Services position
- Army Modeling and Simulation Office (AMSO) assigned to CAA (2009)

- The Under Secretary of the Army designates CAA as the lead agency for theater operational wargaming efforts
- Russia Invades Ukraine seizing the Crimea and parts of the Donets Basin, 2014








# Time

1999	Relocated from Bethesda, Maryland to Fort Belvoir, Virginia
2002	Assigned to the Deputy Chief of Staff, G-8
2009	Integrated the Army Modeling and Simulation Office (AMSO)
